Living Waters International: God's Gift for the MSFS Missions in Africa

"I will praise you, Lord, with all my heart; I will declare all your wondrous deeds" (Ps. 9.1). It is with deep sentiments of gratitude to God and our benefactors in the USA that we remember the collaboration of Living Waters International and the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS) for the past two decades. God's ways are unknown to us. When we allow ourselves to be guided by His plan in our lives, wonderful things takes place. The history of LWI is a history of God's love for humanity in Africa.

It all began in 1993 when Father George Parampukattil, MSFS was making Mission Appeals in Wisconsin and met Mary and Stephen Zimmerman at St. Wenceslaus Parish in Neva. Father George gave their contact information to his blood brother, Father Jose Parampukattil, also MSFS, who was then working in Tanzania. Father Jose invited Mary and Stephen to Tanzania to advise the MSFS in development of 500 acres of newly acquired land near Mbutu in the Tabora Archdiocese. These novice missionaries made two trips to Tanzania in 1994 with high hopes of developing the Mbutu Farm agriculturally. At the close of December 1994, before boarding their return flight to Wisconsin, they met with Father Augustine Mangatt, the Regional Superior of the MSFS in East Africa, and detailed discussion ensued as to the future of the MSFS in Africa and the farm in particular. Paramount from this discussion was Father Mangatt's request to Mary and Stephen if they would consider starting a NGO (non-governmental organization) for the procurement of funds for the fledgling MSFS mission in Tanzania.

Upon returning to Wisconsin, the Zimmermans conferred with friends Karen and Brian Prunty, who shared their enthusiasm for support of the missions. *(Continued on Page 2)*



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Work then began on exploring the possibilities of starting a NGO. After much prayer, paperwork and deliberation, a little over one year later, in February 1996, Living Waters International was founded to assist in developing the Catholic missions in Africa.

Since its foundation, LWI it has provided support to the MSFS missions in Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda, Mozambique, Chad, Cameroon, Namibia and South Africa. LWI has also extended its services to various other religious congregations and dioceses in Africa as well as in India.

We are grateful to LWI for supporting missionary our endeavours in East Africa by soliciting funds for the missions, by creating mission awareness in the U.S., by acting as the fiscal agent for our projects, by creating the Seminarians' Purse for the formation of our seminarians, establishing the bv Student Sponsorship Program through which a number of poor children have received their primary and secondary school education, and by providing food relief to feed the poor children in our missions throughout East Africa.

The MSFS in East Africa thank God for the blessings that we have received through LWI. We gratefully remember the Executive Team of LWI and all the benefactors who support our missions in Africa in various ways. May God bless them and their families abundantly. And may God continue to bless LWI to serve the poor and needy in Africa and to bring the Good News to His people in Africa.

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Appeal for Shipping Costs of Books to SFS Junior Seminary in Tanzania

St. Francis de Sales (SFS) Junior Seminary in Kihonda, Morogoro, Tanzania is a secondary school cum Catholic Junior Seminary where young men pursue their secondary school education while receiving seminary formation. In academic year 2016, enrollment at the school is 284.

Established in 1993, the first class of students graduated from the SFS Junior Seminary in 1997. Over the past two decades, more than one thousand young men have received a quality secondary school education, life skills' formation and spiritual guidance from the school. Many of these graduates are now employed with accredited professional companies both in Tanzania and internationally. Others serve as Catholic priests in the congregation of the *Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales*, in other religious congregations and in Catholic dioceses in Tanzania.

A current need of the *SFS* Seminary is more books for the school's library. Given the changes in world history, politics and science and resultant changes in the school's curriculum over the past 20 plus years, many of the books still currently in use at the school have become outdated in their content. An upgrade to the school's library of books will guarantee the continued provision of quality secondary school education at the seminary.

Books for Africa, an NGO from the **United States** of America has agreed to donate a fortv-foot container with approximate-22,000 ly secondary school books. The value of these books by conserva-

tive IRS estimate is \$264,000! The only cost to the school is shipping. Although a large part of shipping costs have been garnered, about \$4,500 remains to be raised. It is for these remaining shipping costs that the *Missionaries of St Francis de Sales* are requesting our kind support.

Today we are shining the light on two seminarians in need of sponsorship.

Our two seminarians, Mutume Ventino and Patrick Musyimi, are both from the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS) order and both attend Jordan University College in Morogoro, Tanzania. Mutume is in his first year of theology and Patrick is in his second year.



Mutume wants to be a priest in order to serve God and his people. Mutume shares, "I prefer to be a priest in the religious life so that I may reach the poor and marginalized, without neglecting those people who are in need and suffering the most. This way of life will enable me to deepen my spiritual life and I can help the people in their spiritual life and sacramental life." More importantly, Mutume wishes to serve his country as a priest and promote more vocations to the

priestly life by showing himself as an example to others, especially the young ones. He would like to serve his family as a priest by bringing its members more closely to God.

When asked what his benefactor should pray for, he replied, "I would ask them to pray for me fervently so that I may fulfil my priestly duties and in return I promise them my prayers to the Almighty."



Patrick would like to be a Catholic priest to serve God and his people and to live a consecrated life. "I prefer to be a priest in the religious life that I may form a strong sense of community among believers, particularly for the poor. In the person of Jesus Christ, I will show others the path of life through the sacraments of initiation, healing and vocations." His greatest desire is to be a priest that will evangelize and teach Christian values and the sacramental life. "I also hope to serve

my family as a priest by praying for them and encouraging them to live the Christian faith."

Patrick's request of his benefactor would be for them to pray for him to be a good priest, and then, "I promise them my prayers always."

*Expenses incurred by the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales for the formation of a seminarian are typically \$3,000 annually. The Seminarians' Purse is an initiative to support future priests of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales in the Province of East Africa. The MSFS began their apostolate in East Africa in 1988. Forty-nine MSFS priests currently serve in parish missions in Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Mozambique. These missionaries are involved in religious formation, formal education, vocational training and social services, including caring for street children, empowering women and providing medical services.
