On Any Given Sunday

Convent Dedicated in Memory of Long-time Music Minister

The sport's expression, "on any given Sunday" describes the excitement of knowing anything is possible when two professional football teams play... For Catholics, "on any given Sunday" could describe how a single Mass might inspire us to make anything possible. Living Waters International, founded in 1996, came into existence because of the influence of the Holy Spirit during a Mass.

Brian and Karen Prunty heard the call during Mission Sunday Mass at their parish, St. Mary's in Antigo. On that same weekend at a neighboring parish, St. Wenceslaus in Neva, Stephen and Mary Zimmerman received their call. Both families began to support the visiting African missionaries who spoke at their respective parishes in their own way; the Prunty's by sending money, and the Zimmerman's by traveling to Tanzania to assist with an agricultural project. It took a while, but eventually the Prunty's and Zimmerman's learned they were supporting the same African missionary congregation. The result of their shared experience was the formation of Living Waters International (LWI), a non-profit public charitable organization. Sadly, Mary Zimmer-

man never got the opportunity to see what became of the seed she helped plant; she died at the age of 36 from a terminal illness within months of LWI's start.

LWI has grown thanks to the generosity of US based charitable foundations and hundreds of benefactors. In recent years LWI has been able to annually send overseas between \$700 thousand and \$1 million to support religious congregations in almost a dozen countries.

Today LWI works in three primary areas; grant-writing, student sponsorships, and project fundraising.

LWI acts as a fiscal agent for non-US based religious congregations. In its role as a fiscal agent, LWI requests grants from US Foundations on behalf of missionaries working in Africa. This effort is led by Stephen Zimmerman, who works on nearly 100 grant applications each year.

It is well worth the effort because in a typical year 50-60% of the grant applications submitted get funded. Steve is assisted by Monsignor Paul Koszarek, a retired Green Bay Diocesan priest living in the Crandon area. "Our work is important because some US foundations will not consider applications submitted from missionaries outside the US. Without Living Waters International, many missionary initiatives simply would not get funded," said Zimmerman.

The student sponsorship program continues to grow. "Presently we have 220 students located in four different East African countries being supported by families here in the states. Many of the students are orphans, and those with families are among the poorest of the poor," said Karen Prunty. "Without Living She went on to say, "We are so very grateful for our current benefactors, and we are praying for new sponsors because the list of waiting poor African children is long."

LWI's efforts have borne fruit, "We have been able to find generous people to help build and equip schools, feed the poor, and heal the sick," said Brian Prunty. One of the most gratifying efforts was sending money

to save a small child, named Goretti who was born with her bladder outside of her stomach cavity. Following Gorebirth the family was told to make her as comfortable as possible, but to expect the worst. Unwilling to accept this fate, the family reached

out to the Church who asked for help from LWI. "Funds raised at food sales in Wrightstown and Antigo, together with donations from others, got her the surgeries she needed," said Eileen Hartl. More financial aid for Goretti will be needed for future surgeries as she grows.

Over the years board directors and supporters of LWI have traveled to Africa to see for themselves the impact being made. In February the Prunty's, along with long-time supporter George Shinners, also of Antigo,

trekked to Kenya and Tanzania for such a visit. "This trip's objectives were to meet as many of the sponsored students as possible, as well as visit missionary project sites where we played a role in the last two years," said Karen Prunty. The 14 day trip was productive with 26 site visits, including 18 schools where 81 children are sponsored.

The highlight of the trip came in the final days, when the group traveled to Dumila, Tanzania to partici-

pate in the blessing of a newly constructed convent, which was placed in close proximity to a pre-primary school that opened last year. Both the school and convent made possible were through the generosity of George and Jane Shinners.

said George Shinners. The sisters living in the convent administer and teach at the school.

The Shinners made their gift for the convent in memory of Colleen Krivoshein, who was the music director at SS. Mary & Hyacinth in Antigo for over 30 years. Colleen died in early 2018 at the age of 58. "Colleen was a wonderful person who inspired many through her music ministry. She gave so much of her time and talent to area churches. We wanted Colleen's family to know the impact she made. She will not be forgotten," said Jane Shinners.

Dear Friends, this issue's spotlight is on our "Friends of Living Waters" from Wrightstown, WI, particularly Bonnie and Dick Vanden Wymelenberg & Rose and Don Aerts. Since the summer of 2003, these friends of Living Waters have been annually organizing a brat fry and fresh baked pie sale to benefit Living Waters. Beginning in 2008, Catholic Financial Life also joined in contributing matching funds of \$500. This year's event will be Saturday, June 8, 10:00 – 6:00 PM.

What makes this event so special is the people of course, and the good fruits their efforts bear. But even more special, Bonnie and Dick are parents to Living Waters' secretary, Karen Prunty. Bonnie explains, "We do our brat and pie sale each year because we see the good our daughter Karen and her husband Brian are involved with in helping the poor in Africa. It is our Christian duty and a gift to the poor." Another special aspect is its location: Dick's Family Foods, owned and operated by the Vanden Wymelenberg family since 1908, when Dick's grandparents first opened its doors.

The pie preparation for this summer fundraiser begins the preceding summer and fall when berry, apple and rhubarb seasons are in full swing. The pie fillings are prepared and stored in the store's freezer. Once March rolls around, Bonnie and daughters Karen and Mary Ann Ozarowicz assemble several dozens of pies and send them to the store's freezer where they remain fresh, frozen, and ready for baking. The pies are then baked the morning of the sale by the head baker of the store. Bonnie tells us, "If it weren't for the store, we just couldn't do it." Rose contributes to the tally with her "famous" lemon meringue pie. Bonnie and Rose could well be dubbed as a dynamic duo. "We

go back a very long way. I don't recall the year, but I first met Rose when we hired her to work behind the deli." Over the years they worked the store, joined exercise classes, volunteered for civic causes and various ministries of their home parish, St. Clare. "One of us would be inspired to volunteer for a cause and would ask the other to join us. We've also recruited many loyal helpers and family members right on down to the grandchildren."



I couldn't help but reflect on Bonnie's admission of their being inspired by Karen. Surely, they as parents must've been Karen's first examples of compassion for the poor, to love, that is, to will the good of another. The "another" in this cause has a name, Goretti (the little girl in Africa who you have helped us to assist). In this Season of Easter please rejoice with us, as we rejoice in all of you fulfilling your Christian duty to love one another and to resurrect hope and consolation in others as we ourselves have received hope and consolation in Him.
