Early Childhood Education in Mozambique - By Stephen Zimmerman

In Mozambique, as in many parts of Africa where many are unevangelized, the education of children and their introduction to the Catholic faith is the entry into the establishment of the Christian faith. In Mozambique, where civil war and its aftereffects impeded proclamation of the faith for nearly a quarter century, Catholic missionaries are now making inroads.

As I had shared with you in previous LWI newsletters, the *Missionary Sisters of Mary Help of Christians* are ministering to the poor in Ponta do Ouro village in southern Mozambique. A kindergarten for the children of the village is their chosen instrument to instruct children in the Catholic faith and to give them an academic education, both of which will help to protect them from exposure to human trafficking and other social ills.

The initial building plan included 2 classrooms, a kitchen, a storeroom and 3 toilets for girls and three for boys. A recently enacted requirement of the Mozambican government has mandated a dining hall for the kindergarten, thus increasing the overall budget by about US \$10,000.

With the grant of \$40,000 earlier this year, building construction has advanced amazingly well. Stages completed to date include leveling of the land and site preparation; excavation & laying of the foundation with concrete, rock and iron beams; erection of brick walls with supporting iron beams; roofing and doors. All of this has been achieved with most diligent local labor under the direction of a competent contractor.

Work yet to be completed includes exterior finish of the walls with stucco plaster; drywall construction; electrical installation; interior plastering and painting of walls; completing the installation of doors and windows; plumbing for toilets and kitchen; and laying a tile floor.

The Good News is that the work completed thus far is all now under roof, and therefore not exposed to the environment. Funds of \$48,500 have been paid to the contractor with just over \$45,000 still needed for completion of the kindergarten. Please keep praying and offer your financial support if possible.

SUGARCANE INITIATIVE UPDATE:

In the 2018 spring newsletter, we introduced Reverend Angelo Kaizirege, pastor of the Ibumbida Mission Parish in Tanzania, whose parish inherited fifty acres of land from the government to cultivate sugar. This in turn spurred an initiative by parishioners to use income generated by the crops to help less fortunate families send their children to school. The challenge before them was the startup cost in which you responded in kind.

On behalf of the parishioners, we wish to express our gratitude to all those who have sponsored our cause." Looking to the next growing season, they would like to cultivate at least five acres and once again, Father humbly has requested our financial aid. It takes several hundred dollars to plant and cultivate an acre of sugarcane. Once it is planted, it can be harvested over an eight to ten-year period. while the initial investment is high, over the long term, it will provide

After over twenty years since our inception, Living Waters has hired an assistant to Karen Prunty, Secretary & Coordinator of the Living Waters Student Sponsorship Program. It's Jeane Meade. Jeane is no stranger to the work of Living Waters. Karen shares, "She has been a great resource for technology in developing and maintaining programs to assist Living Waters." But let us first go back to her early

years as a child, growing up on a dairy farm, just south of Antigo.

She's number one in the line of nine children! "My mom had a large garden which we had to weed and weed and weed. But we each had our own row of the penny packet from Gurney's seeds – you never knew what kind of surprises there were! That began my love of gardening. We also played lots of word games and always had books around; I'm an avid reader, especially historical fiction." These things alone tell us how she developed her resourcefulness and laboriousness, along with her profound sense of wonder of God's creation, and it explains how she ended up at the top of her class in 2005 in networking and computer

support.

Her roots with LWI go back to the early 90's when Living Waters cofounders Mary and Stephen Zimmerman first came to Langlade County to make it their home. "Our paths kept crossing. Church in Phlox, Master Gardner program, the early Antigo Farmer's Markets. Then in the mid-2000's, when I was teaching Microsoft Office evening classes at NTC, Steve told me about this program he was working with – Living Waters – and the challenge in registering the donations. I mentioned that we had used an Access program to enter orders where I worked, Sheldons, Inc. (manufacturer of Mepps fishing lures). I thought with modifications, that it would work for this purpose. Steve and I worked on the program until we went live with it around 2005; it is still being used today."

When I saw LWI was looking for a part-time employee, I thought, 'What a great fit, something to keep me busy along with a myriad of other projects I'm looking forward to in this new road in life.'
